Moments that change life forever

My name is Stefanie Didszun, and I call the beautiful city of Dresden my home

For my father Wilfried, my mother Kerstin, my sister Maria, and me, there are two dates — or for a handful of people, at least one — that changed our lives completely.

Thursday, October 14, 2021, changed our lives forever.

On that day, Martin went to work as usual. But on his way home, an aneurysm ruptured in his brain. Thanks to the quick actions of emergency responders and doctors, he was airlifted to the hospital here in Dresden. When I first saw him in the hospital, I thought of COVID-19 — the dominant image in the media at the time.

Then my mother called and asked, "Do you know what Martin thought about organ donation?"

I did. I knew he was in favor of it — as we all are in our family. That phone call was how I found out that my brother was in the hospital — and that he was brain dead. He had been carrying his organ donor card with him.

It took four days — to let go, and to be able to let go.

Four days until brain death was officially confirmed.

Four days of shock.

Four days to say goodbye.

Four days in Dresden-Friedrichstadt Hospital, where nurses, staff, and doctors did everything they could for Martin — and for us.

Four days until the organ donation.

On October 18, 2021, at 1:50 p.m., Martin passed away — and became a hero.

Six adults and one child were given a second chance at life. His early death gave others hope.

I am proud that my hometown, Dresden, is hosting the World Transplant Games — a celebration of people who have received a new lease on life through organ donation; of people who never gave up and overcame tremendous adversity; of people who could not be here without the death of another

The "Spenderfamilien Netzwerk" — a network of donor families from across Germany — wishes, amidst all the celebration, for a spark of reverence in memory of the loss we live with every day.

As organ donation receives more attention, we simply ask not to be forgotten.

A word of thanks can make even the deepest sorrow feel a little lighter.
